Election Data Choose **ONE** of the following National Election's from the start of the 20th Century: 1900, 1904, 1908, 1912, 1916, 1920, 1924, 1928, 1932, 1936, 1940, 1944, 1948, 1952, 1956

Choose **ONE** of the following National Elections from the 2nd Half of the 20th Century & Start of the 21st Century: 1960, 1964, 1968, 1972, 1976, 1980, 1984, 1988, 1992, 1996, 2000, 2004, 2008, 2012, 2016 or 2020

For Each Election:

- 1. Who were the presidential candidates (there maybe more than two)
- 2. How much money did they each spend on the election?
- 3. What were the major issues of the campaign (at least 3)
- 4. Who won the election and what the electoral college count?
- 5. Did the party of the newly elected president win the House of Representatives?
- 6. Did the party of the newly elected president win the Senate?

Compare Elections: Once you have broken down each election compare the two elections that you looked at:

- 1. How did the electoral map change from one election to the other in terms of which states voted for which political party?
- 2. Why did these states change (if they did) or why did they stay the same?
 - a. Economic? b. Social? c. Parties Change Platforms?
- 3. How much did the spending on each election change? Find the numbers based on inflation over time to get a better comparison see below...inflation calculator
- 4. How did the House & Senate Change and why?
