AP Psychology Project #3

The 3rd project for this six weeks will be a "hands-on" project that will challenge your creativity and "right-brain" thinking. It will involve an application of terms from this course in <u>ANY</u> venue that you choose. The terms that you include with your project can be term's that we have covered or something that you might be interested in that we did not cover that deals with psychology.

The "sky really is the limit" with this project. I would like for this to be interesting, engaging and fun. Try to come up with an idea for this that perhaps no student will do, this will be a challenge but I know that you will do some interesting projects, think outside the box.

Each project should include a minimum of <u>seven</u> psychology terms (I will count biology terms, if for example you were to do a project such as a brain or neuron model.)

Depending on the nature of your project, you may have to apply your terms on paper to explain what you did with these. For example, if you do a painting or write poetry, you will need to submit your terms on paper and explain how they are applied.

I will allow you to work with <u>one</u> other student on this project if you want to, but if you work with another student then you will need to apply <u>fifteen</u> terms.

Some examples of projects could be:

Poetry

A website -ScrapbookA short story -Video

A video game -Musical Performance
 Biology models -Drama Performance

Photo essays -Artwork

Each student in class will grade your project as we will do a gallery walk of all the projects.
